HUMAN PERCEPTION HAS LIMITS

REALITY IS FAR TOO COMPLEX FOR US TO TAKE IT ALL IN



<u>Everything-all-at-once.</u> We are exposed to approximately eleven million pieces of information per second (Wilson, 2004)

The genius –and curse– of human cognition is that we have pre–cognitive filters and biases that help us only attend to the stimuli that are <u>relevant</u> to our physical, psychological and social lives.



Hey wait! Aren't biases bad?

To avoid being overwhelmed by everything-all-at-once, we MUST rely on cognitive pre-filters, biases, and shortcuts to navigate in our physical and social worlds. But how do we know what is "<u>relevant</u>"? We need trusted elders, teachers, peers and lived experiences to determine relevance.

What cultural and social sources – and forces – guide our senses to know WHO matters and WHO does not and WHAT is dangerous and WHAT is not?
